- Recently, CGS has been getting many questions related to academic regalia. To be transparent about our advocacy and purchasing of regalia for the lending library program, I have included a summary of our work on the academic regalia project since 2023 in my report. Since our original request for additional CSA funding in fall 2023, CGS has:
- 1) generated documentation outlining the operation of the academic regalia program,
- 2) researched and determined in spring 2024 OSU was charging more for doctoral regalia rentals than any other school in the Big 10 or the top five largest institutions in Ohio,



- 3) formally submitted our request for purchasing regalia, and
- 4) continued to communicate with administration in the Office of Student Life, Office of Business and Finance, Graduation Services, and the Graduate School regarding execution of the program.
- Given my position as Treasurer and relationship with the Student Life business office, I have been spearheading this initiative since summer 2024. When further updates are requested or a major change/update happens, I will let you know. In the meantime, I would be happy to answer individual questions as they arise, recognizing that this work is still actively happening.

#### Q+A:

- Mace.103: Have you contacted the current vice president, Katie Connor, about what's involved? If you have, what have you learned? If you haven't, what would you want to learn before you began this position?
- Gronewald.2: Did reach out to her and had many emails back and forth, did not attend the Hayes Forum because I was in the field last week but we talked a lot about that, always more to learn
- RaeiDehagi.1: Reached out to her and asked about the most challenging aspects of the job, Hayes Forum has a lot of challenges keeping up with emails and logistics
- Zaitseva.1: Reached out to her, asked about most rewarding part of the position and she said it was being with you all, the most unexpectedly challenging part of the position was answering all the emails she has to get through
- Chisam.1: Have you ever once attended the Hayes Forum and what specific changes would you make to it?



- Zaitseva.1: I attended last year and the year before. A lot of people in my department have given up on submitting their work because they don't usually get recognized, so I would find more judges who align more with those kinds of research.
- RaeiDehagi.1: Attended this year, I would like to make it as accessible as possible since I'm a special education teacher
- Gronewald.2: Didn't attend because of fieldwork, don't feel like my department gets heard so would also find better judges
- o Carrera. 55: What are the most important responsibilities for the CGS VP?
- Gronewald.2: Hayes Forum is the largest portion of it, stepping in for the President when needed, keeping up with and being on top of all the committees, being a person that someone can come and talk to
- RaeiDehagi.1: Hayes is the most important, taking care of elections with transparency, being able to get the council to run smoothly
- Zaitseva.1: Be a link between the President and all of the committees and delegates and be a point of contact, be in communication with all of the committees and offices
- PerezSoto.2: Given all current events, this position will support President and Senators, how are you going to handle those unofficial roles?
- Zaitseva.1: I'm a teacher, so I can stand on my non-negotiables and support the President
- Gronewald.2: Being loud and not being afraid to speak up and be organized, have to stay on top of the emails
- RaeiDehagi.1: I have experience working in those groups and I think being the candidate means we're responsible already. I have the ability, experience and enough time
- Motion to extend by a CGSer on Zoom by 5 minutes, seconded by Booker.200
- Carrera.55: One of the main responsibilities is assigning and overseeing delegate appointments. From your personal experience, how comfortable are you and what skills do you have that you can manage 100's of people?
- Gronewald.2: I do have experience managing 10s of people, worked for a company after I graduated and oversaw 50 or so people, listening to who wants to be on what committee and making tough decisions is important
- o **RaeiDehagi.1**: I don't have experience working with 100s of people. I will do my best because I don't have any experience.
- Zaitseva.1: Oversaw 10 people in a graduate student-led organization, I love emails
  and they don't have give me any anxiety, I'm pretty good at managing
- Elton.21: You all have different experiences before now, how would you transfer skills from your experiences into the role of VP?
- Zaitseva.1: As president of our organization, the skills are pretty directly transferable.
   Being in rooms with different people who have different roles, faculty are pretty open in my department so being able to have that insider information and hearing different viewpoints is a benefit
- RaeiDehagi.1: As president in our organization in Iran, I was the most flexible person
  in that role. I've had really frustrating moments, but I've already had those challenges
  and have been able to get over them
- Gronewald.2: I was on some committees in undergrad and was the president of a couple of organizations and after graduation, still being a leader in the job I was in, these are the most transferable skills
- Carrera.55 moves to extend by 3 minutes
- Ortbahn.1 seconds



- o *Elton.21* moves to amend motion from 3 minutes to 6 minutes
- Rogers.1843 seconds
- Motion passes, extended by 6 minutes
- Multerhopkins.1: As VP you will have a lot of different roles, will you realistically have the bandwidth to have the role and how do you plan to stay organized?
- Gronewald.2: After this semester I'm done with courses so just research, an extra 20 hours a week is still a lot of time but it's definitely manageable, I'm very organized and Katie has set us up pretty well
- RaeiDehagi.1: I'm almost finished with my courses, just nine credits left, and I may continue as a volunteer for the PIECE program but other than that I don't have any other priorities
- Zaitseva.1: Also way past my coursework, writing my dissertation actively and frees
  up Calendar space, proven myself to be adaptable by switching from one department
  with a teaching responsibility to an entirely new role as a research assistant

- Booker.200: I'm curious about interpersonal communication, and how you handle moments of tension or conflict, particularly if you could speak to experiences in CGS or experiences in student government student organizations?
- Engel.210: In addition to my role in CGS, I'm also the president of the French and Italian Graduate Student Association. And in that role there has been a lot of tension that's come up with working with the department. Specifically, we've had to advocate for making sure that some of the things about the graduate exams are standardized because they were not previously and in situations like that, I've learned the importance of continually addressing the problem, even when there's pushback. #### 8.3 Grad Caucus Further Updates & Discussion

- 8.3.1) Feedback for the Enrollment and Student Progress Committee
  - *Elton.21*: Senator representative for the Enrollment and Student Progress Committee, the Council on Enrollment and Student Progress monitors the recruitment, admission, retention, degree completion, and graduation of all students. The Council advises on policies that affect the characteristics of the student body, and that impact timely completion of degrees. #### 8.3.2) Updates on DEI Committee for University Senate

Pathak.89: CGS Representative on Diversity in the University Senate, Peter has linked a web page on OSU key issues. Web page currently has university approved guidance on a number of things, including what to do If ICE comes into your classroom. Difficult to get OSU legal and OSUPD to actually endorse any type of statement or guidance on what exactly to hand out to people, lots of unofficial guidance being passed around by faculty and law school. Official guidance is very brief. Diversity has been in limbo and a lot of that is because there has not been a lot of guidance on what comes after Ted Carter's email in February. For instance in his email, he says that while those 3 offices that he mentioned are being either completely chopped or renamed into some sort of civil compliance, individual department and student government DEI committees are exempt from the chopping block. However, it seemed that he also communicated to faculty who are on Senate Diversity that he is still reviewing all of these organizations. It's unclear what he means by that, faculty and staff on Senate Diversity are also concerned and confused by what this means. In particular, folks are kind of worried because there's this website from the Education Department called enddei.gov. Very little information on what makes this information eligible, mostly it's just this open form where you can put in who I am, an email, the name of an educational institution, the address, some sort of email contact for this educational institution. After submitting, the website just says it will launch an investigation and does not clarify what that means. Currently, the committee has decided that it will not change its name until we're explicitly asked to. This is not official guidance. This is just what the members of the committee have currently decided. We've been able to get a meeting with Ted Carter on the board for the month of March.

# Colleagues,

As the semester draws to a close, and as many of you prepare to graduate OSU or move on from CGS for various reasons, I want to say Thank You. Thank you for all of your hard work to ensure the graduate student experience is the best it can be. This year was not easy for many of us, and despite this, we worked tirelessly to pass two impactful resolutions and host ten wonderful events! Going into next year, I hope to prioritize our advocacy alongside your well-being and safety. Know CGS will always be here to advocate for you and your fellow peers, and we will always center your thoughts and concerns.

# Over the Past Month:

- Exec: We are starting to transition chairs, so you may start seeing new faces appear during report time! Please ensure all of our chairs feel welcome! If you're interested in chairing a committee, feel free to reach out! We are still looking for chairs for Academic Affairs, Diversity & Inclusion, and International Student Affairs committees for the upcoming academic year! Also, if you'd be interested in running for CGS Presidency in the future, I am holding my Chief of Staff position open for such a person! Just send me an email if interested!
- **Graduate School:** The minimum stipend was raised! YAY! But also, the Bursar's Office is *still* attempting to end the Graduate Student Payroll Deduction service. This is unacceptable, as if this service is terminated, students would need to pay these fees monthly, and they may even have to enroll in a payment plan that costs \$30 a semester. I am doing my best alongside GCBC to argue against this move. Additionally, though other Big10s are rescinding admission offers, the Graduate School continues to instruct units to continue with normal admissions. Lastly, programs like Preparing for the Professoriate and Dissertation Bootcamps will be housed within the Graduate School and will be re-focused to center on equity for participants.
- University Senate: This month's Senate meeting was difficult. Steering called for an open discussion on the question: How can we maintain our values and continue to support and care for all members of our OSU community within the evolving legal framework? This question made many of our international student senators uncomfortable, and thus the only concern CGS stated during this session was insisting senate begins to focus on the safety and well-being of its people. With constant attention drawn to senate and senators, University Senate must do better to ensure those who feel silenced are still being heard. I continue to speak on this issue of silencing not only at senate, but everywhere I can, including at the Grad School and even the Arts & Sciences townhall.



- Funding Concerns: If you have a funding concern, ERIK would like you to reach out to them, as per CGS's special bulletins. Additionally, Fulbrights almost had their funding pulled this past month. I worked quickly with the Grad School and OIA to find emergency funding for those students, but it wasn't needed. Basically, a freeze to funding resulted in a cash flow shortage for the US Department of State, which operates the Fulbright program. Students and faculty whose stipends were paid by Fulbright commissions in the home countries were not impacted (this includes Ohio State students and faculty who are abroad). However, students and faculty from under-developed countries, which do not have Fulbright commissions, were impacted. This is because the US Department of State provides the stipends for these Fulbrighters. Fortunately, the funding freeze has been lifted, and the State department is resuming payments to Fulbrighters that they support. And now, if something does happen, we have identified funding to help those impacted.
- Events I attended on CGS's Behalf: Dr. Shivers Student Gov't Leader Dinners, Dean Danny Student Gov't Presidential Dinner, SEI Committee, Digitial Accessibility Stakeholder's Committee

# Working On:

- Meeting with Dean Stromberger: I know you all want Dean Stromberger to hold a townhall and/or meet with CGS to discuss all things funding and beyond. I've been working as hard as I can but both Dean Stromberger and Peter Mohler (ERIK) were out of office often this past month. In my monthly meeting with Dean Stromberger we discussed retention, of which she should have real figures on after decision day on April 15. That being said, I suggest to you all that she come to our May meeting or host her own townhall after decision day so we can be presented with concrete data regarding how all things federal and state have impacted retention. I would hope this could help us with future advocacy. Additionally, I will be meeting with ERIK after our CGS meeting to discuss how emergency funding processes work and to invite them to speak with us.
- Center for Belonging and Social Change: It is important to note that CGS is being actively consulted regarding how to use the space this center occupied. We have advocated that 30 student organizations have a say in the shaping of this space. More updates to come by our next CGS meeting.

Hey folks,

As this is going to be my last solo Vice President's report for CGS, and as April is typically a short report anyways, I wanted to take this space to reflect a little on my time in office and express my gratitude. I apologize in advance for being wordy, emotional, and likely a little silly sounding in the following paragraphs... however I expect you all not to be surprised by this as that is generally who I have always been as a person, scholar, and leader.

To start, I was first elected into this role three years ago in May 2022 after a series of events left the newly elected VP stepping into the Presidency after the then elected President left OSU to pursue their PhD elsewhere. At the time I was nervous, but excited to serve CGS and graduate students through this role, and to pay forward the mentorship, advice, opportunities, and energy that I had been gifted in my time as a delegate and chair in the prior years. I set the bar for myself sky high and hoped to aggressively grow the delegate membership, help further recover Hayes from the hit it had taken due to COVID, and help with a range of smaller projects including archival work, updating bylaws, and other related tasks. I am proud to say that I honestly feel that these goals were met, and exceeded in my time as VP. With many dedicated hours of work and well-informed advice from many of you, together we have grown CGS's average delegate count from 60 to around 80. We have updated our governing documents to help further clarify our procedures, the standards of conduct to which we hold ourselves in service of our colleagues, and to have them better reflect CGS's goals and practices. We have grown the Hayes Forum back to pre-COVID numbers (with 2025 marking a 10-year high for application and presentation numbers), expanded the poster and postdoctoral sessions, increased judge recruitment and participation (both in the range of fields and methodologies represented, as well as in number alone), and additionally adopted more sustainable and accessible practices that help welcome a broader swath of graduate students not just in letter, but in spirit. I say we because this work isn't ever done alone. While I am the "eldritch" CGSer and expert in some areas, I am certainly not in all. Hayes has a committee. You all are the experts in your own departments, colleges, and fields, and have helped connect me to your leadership and faculty, and helped me to recruit your friends and colleagues into our membership. I have appreciated and valued the kind advice, honest feedback, and sometimes firm criticism I have received in this role. It's helped me to grow as a scholar, a leader, and a person. And more importantly, CGS and Hayes have reaped the benefits and grown from the involvement and dedication shown by us as a community in collectively helping our membership grow and one of our oldest and largest programs succeed year after year.

The number of folks I have to thank number in the dozens, but I'd like to focus in particular on a couple of groups, and a few individuals who have been especially instrumental and invaluable throughout my time in office...

I've loved getting to know you all, your work, and your passions. You all are part of the something special that have kept me in CGS for so long, and the reason that so many of my closest friends come from our ranks.

To Erica Brown, Jen Pelletier, Matt Couch, Blair Lozier, and Anna Sullivan Kvam – I've known you all varying lengths of time, but in that time you have all shown dedication and care for me and CGSers not only professionally, but personally. Thank you for your advice, your wisdom, your pragmatism, and your dedication to CGS and its success. This is my last time writing a report as your Treasurer and Ray Travel Award (RTA) Committee Chair for the Council of Graduate Students.

My time as your Treasurer has been both professionally and personally fulfilling, and it's been a privilege to manage the financial wellbeing of this government representing thousands of graduate students at one of the biggest institutions of higher education in the U.S.

In my role as Treasurer, I've spent the past two years supporting, counseling, and servicing the initiatives and committees of this body to better the graduate student experience at OSU. With surpluses in funds from the COVID-19 pandemic and a return to in-person classes, research, events, & activities, I prioritized spending down our carryforward funds to pre-pandemic levels. As the RTA committee chair, I prioritized updating the website and application to be more straightforward/streamlined and homing in on a steady acceptance rate independent of funding period. My graduate student experience has been changed for the better because of this position and by getting to work with so many of you in this position.

# Fiscal Committee - Gabriel Guzman Camacho (guzmancamacho.1)

One meeting on SOFS where we discuss the review of budget petitions. No conclusive outcome on last Fiscal Committee meeting, and possible meeting March 4.

# **Graduate Comp & Benefits – Brian Rocha.51 (rocha.51)**

Our draft report is in the works currently and should be ready for dissemination in early May. We are making recommendations in line with cost-of-living realities in Columbus, pushing for the establishment of a 12-month funding system for all GAs, as the 9-month minimum contract recipient population is the most financially vulnerable. We are suggesting actionable items both the Graduate School, Colleges, and departments can take to improve these conditions.

# **Diversity Committee – Deb Pathak.89 (pathak.89)**

Senate Diversity met twice this month including a meeting with Sara Childers. We received word that Senate Diversity/OIE/OAA/Faculty Affairs/etc still have little-to-no transparency about who is on the "working group" deciding to review/close/restructure offices. Directives from President and Provost's office are being driven mostly by compliance with Exec. Order, Dear Colleague Letter, and SB1. Sara Childers presented on Inclusive Excellence Restorative Options for Conflict Resolution Initiative (ROCR) which is a new program mostly focused on faculty so far.

# **Council on Student Affairs – Peter Carrera (carrera.55)**

The Council on Student Affairs is continuing work on the Student Activity Fee Review (determining distribution of funds and reviewing signature funding requests). A CSA ad hoc small group is working on additional options for the update to the Code of Student Conduct after receiving feedback from Faculty Council & different university senate leaders. These options will be submitted to CSA for review and finalization. We heard a presentation from Student Life fiscal office.

# Intellectual & Property, Patents, and Copyright Committee- Brian Rocha (rocha.51)

We are working with and making recommendations to the team who oversees the "Entrepreneurial Roadmap" process at OSU, discussing how the process can be better improved for both faculty and graduate students looking to license or patent research and work in line with university requirements or self-directed interest in commercializing research. The team that oversees this work is in the office of innovation and economic development and they have been very receptive to our feedback and want to continue working with us to improve these processes.

## Council on Academic Affairs – Andrew Miles (miles.375)

Andrew issued a statement to CAA and entered the statement directly into the meeting minutes by unanimous consent of the committee. CAA also approved a new online professional masters



degree in systems engineering. The provost will be joining a meeting to discuss the academic affairs landscape in an upcoming meeting. The coordinating committee for reaccreditation also begins meetings at the end of March.

#### The statement is below:

With the closure of ODI, driven by federal and state legislation, we, The Council of Grad Students, recognize its potential impact on academic affairs. We strongly encourage CAA to assess how the elimination and sundowning of this office and its programs, alongside the removal of DEI initiatives, may affect the quality of education for professional, graduate, and undergraduate students in both qualitative and quantitative ways.

CAA has a duty to ensure that all academic programming, inside and outside the classroom, upholds our mission of delivering a high-quality education and preparing a globally competitive workforce. Academic affairs are the foundational of any university, and this issue is critical to our upcoming reaccreditation process. It would be not in alignment with our mission not to examine the impact of this closure on educational quality and identify solutions for any gaps that exist due to the removal of programs, initiatives, or services. CGS has serious concerns about these implications and look forward to updates from CAA. For the record, I respectfully request unanimous consent to submit these remarks as spoken into the meeting minutes.

Council on Academic Freedom & Responsibility – Tony Annerino (annerino.2) No meeting.

Rules Committee – Jorge E. Clavo Abbass (clavoabbass.1) No relevant update to share.

**Library Committee – Gabriel Guzman Camacho (guzmancamacho.1)**No relevant update to share.

University Research Committee – Tony Annerino (annerino.2) / Andrew Miles (miles.375) Andrew has been working with Dr. Carnes on semi-PI status for graduate students that are awarded research funds and if they equitably have the ability to manage those funds through Workday or another means. This would be a good conversation to have at the upcoming CGS meeting in April- to help identify issues in the system in how those funds can be managed. URC met on March 7th, and that meeting began with a discussion about faculty rule 3335-5-04 regarding possible changes to the policies governing the process of investigating faculty accused of research misconduct to expedite the process since the current rules call for procedures that take excessively long times. ERIK solicited feedback from URC on questions to ask center and institute directors during the upcoming 2025 center and institute review that intends to ensure strategic alignment of centers and institutes with current university priorities. The planned format of this review is a 30-minute presentation by each director followed by a 30minute question and answer period where questions will largely target evaluating the unique added value provided by the center or institute. URC requested that directors are explicitly asked to describe the added value provided by their center or institute to undergraduate and graduate research. URC will meet next on April 4th.

# Committee on Academic Technology – Tony Annerino (annerino.2)

CAT met on March 3<sup>rd</sup> and spent a large fraction of the meeting discussing individual technical difficulties of a member faculty representative with her university managed device. There was a brief discussion about approved AI tools where members were reminded to refer people to the



following web page that lists university-approved AI tools to which people are allowed to upload university data to because they are secured and do not send your provided data to a public cloud: <a href="https://ai.osu.edu/faculty-staff-students/approved-ai-tools">https://ai.osu.edu/faculty-staff-students/approved-ai-tools</a>. Later discussion was about the state of planning for digital accessibility conversion of Carmen courses, and this boiled down to the conclusion that this is an extremely time-consuming task, but it also has not yet been quantified how long that might take for the currently least-accessible classes that involve large quantities of hand-written notes containing equations. CAT also received a presentation about the Drake Institute for Teaching and Learning, whose website can be found here: <a href="https://drakeinstitute.osu.edu/">https://drakeinstitute.osu.edu/</a>. CAT will meet next on April 14th.

**Council on Enrollment and Student Progress – Thomas Elton (elton.21)**No update.

# **Government Affairs – Bryan Perez Soto (perezsoto.2)**

The committee met twice this month. The first meeting was held and became a Q&A on SB1. The second meeting discussed what is the case of action given that SB1 passed in the house of representatives.
