1 RESOLUTION2122-001 2 A RESOLUTION IN SUPPORT OF THE OHIO STATE UNIVERSITY'S SARS-COV-2 VACCINE 3 **MANDATE**

> WHEREAS the Council of Graduate Students (CGS) is the representative body of all graduate students enrolled at The Ohio State University as established by Article II Section 1 of the CGS Constitution; and

WHEREAS the Council of Graduate Students or its appointed representative(s) have the power to act as an 10 advisory agent on behalf of graduate students on all matters brought before personnel, committees, or agencies of The Ohio State University involving the interest of graduate students as established in Article III Section 3 of the

12 CGS Constitution; and

14 WHEREAS, as of August 29th, 2021, the United State's Centers for Disease Control determined that Franklin 15 County and all other counties in Ohio were then, and are still, experiencing high levels of COVID-19 community 16 transmission amidst the delta variant surge alongside notable upticks in hospitalization and mortality rates in the state 1 2; and 17

19 WHEREAS on August 23rd, 2021 the United States Food and Drug Administration announced that it had given 20 full approval to the Pfizer-BioNTech SARS-COV-2 vaccine (henceforth referred to by its market name Comirnaty (koe-mir'-na-tee) aka [ko mir' no ti]) "for the prevention of COVID-19 in individuals 16 and older"; and <sup>3</sup> 21

23 WHEREAS per the US Food and Drug Administration, "FDA-approved vaccines undergo the agency's standard 24 process for reviewing the quality, safety and effectiveness of medical products. For all vaccines, the FDA 25 evaluates data and information included in the manufacturer's submission of a biologics license application 26 (BLA). A BLA is a comprehensive document that is submitted to the agency providing very specific requirements. 27 For Comirnaty, the BLA builds on the extensive data and information previously submitted that supported the 28 [Emergency Use Authorization, henceforth EUA] EUA, such as preclinical and clinical data and information, as 29 well as details of the manufacturing process, vaccine testing results to ensure vaccine quality, and inspections of 30 the sites where the vaccine is made. The agency conducts its own analyses of the information in the BLA to make sure the vaccine is safe and effective and meets the FDA's standards for approval."; and 1

33 WHEREAS acting FDA Commissioner Janet Woodcock, M.D has stated, "The FDA's approval of this vaccine 34 is a milestone as we continue to battle the COVID-19 pandemic. While this and other vaccines have met the 35 FDA's rigorous, scientific standards for emergency use authorization, as the first FDA-approved COVID-19 36 vaccine, the public can be very confident that this vaccine meets the high standards for safety, effectiveness, and 37 manufacturing quality the FDA requires of an approved product," and, "While millions of people have already 38 safely received COVID-19 vaccines, we recognize that for some, the FDA approval of a vaccine may now instill additional confidence to get vaccinated. Today's milestone puts us one step closer to altering the course of this 40 pandemic in the U.S. "; and 1

42 WHEREAS other schools in Ohio requiring the COVID-19 vaccine include (but are not limited to) Case Western

43 Reserve University, the Cleveland Institute of Art, Cleveland State University, Denison University, Kenyon 44 College, Mount St. Joseph University, Ohio Wesleyan University, and the College of Wooster; and <sup>4</sup>

66 WHEREAS given that the Centers for Disease Control has stated in regard to COVID-19 generally that, "Wearing 67 masks can help communities slow the spread of COVID-19 when worn consistently and correctly by a majority 68 of people in public settings and when masks are used along with other preventive measures, including social distancing, frequent handwashing, and cleaning and disinfecting,"; and 5

71 WHEREAS given that the Centers for Disease Control has also stated in regard to the recently surging Delta 72 variant specifically, "Given what we know about the Delta variant, vaccine effectiveness, and current vaccine coverage, layered prevention strategies, including wearing masks, are needed to reduce the transmission of this 74 variant. At this time, as we build the level of vaccination nationwide, we must also use all the prevention strategies 75 available, including masking indoors in public places, to stop transmission and stop the pandemic. Everyone who 76 is able, including fully vaccinated people, should wear masks in public indoor places in areas of substantial or 77 high transmission,"; and <sup>6</sup>

79 FINALLY, WHEREAS The Ohio State University's Council of Graduate students advocates for OSU to support and protect graduate students in all facets of their educational, professional, and personal lives to the best of its ability--of which health and safety is a key component, it is clear that advocating for and supporting COVID-19 82 vaccine mandates, masking, and other layered prevention strategies is in the best interest of public health at The Ohio State University, and for the greater Columbus area.

THEREFORE, BE IT RESOLVED that the Council of Graduate Students supports the decision of Kristina M. Johnson along with The Ohio State University's administration, to mandate vaccination against COVID-19 in order to participate in on campus activities for Spring 2022. 87

89 BE IT FURTHER RESOLVED that at this time, the Council of Graduate students also supports a continuing 90 mask mandate in all Ohio State University buildings and facilities, regardless of vaccination status of students,

91	faculty, and staff for, at a minimum, the remainder of the 2021 - 2022 school year, and thereafter so long as case
92	counts in Ohio remain above a substantial level according to Centers for Disease Control criteria.

94 BE IT FURTHER RESOLVED that the Council of Graduate students supports additional COVID-prevention 95 requirements for sporting and other public events at The Ohio State University, such as those implemented by 96 Louisiana State University football and many Columbus area venues that require proof of vaccination or a 97 negative PCR test in the last 72 hours. <sup>7 8</sup>

99 BE IT FINALLY RESOLVED that the Council of Graduate Students directs its President, Vice President, and 100 Chief of Staff to distribute this resolution to all proper leadership and authorities of The Ohio State University 101 and its partners.
